

Letter from the Pastor



You can't escape it. You see the yard signs on your drive through town, you hear the ads on TV or the radio, you know it is that time of year: election season. I know that politics has become a bit of a dirty word in some corners, but pushing aside all of the hype we are reminded that it comes from the Greek word *politika* or "of citizens and the state." In the United States, politics is how we discern the path of our lives together. It's a process.

And on one level, political processes are just simply the ways communities organize their common life. But for people and communities of faith...I think it goes deeper.

For Christians, public policy either helps or hinders our community from living out the commandment *to love our neighbor as ourselves*. I believe that the involvement of Christians in the political process is vital – vital for our society and vital for the living out of God's call on our lives.

There are many ways to be involved in this process-One of the simplest ways is to vote. So, if you're eligible to vote (you're a U.S. citizen and there aren't any reasons your right to vote was suspended or revoked), this letter is for you.

It's been said that the best way to get people to vote is to ask them to create a voting plan. This letter is being written to help you (and anyone you share it with) create your voting plan. Here are the steps I think a solid plan needs:

***Register to vote**. In Connecticut, you can register to vote online, by mail or in person. There are different deadline for each option.

*If you're already registered, check your registration status. If you've changed your address or if you haven't voted for several elections – or just to make sure you're listed correctly on the voter rolls – do this to make sure everything is right.

All the information on registering and your registration status can be found online at the CT Secretary of State website.

***Find your voting place.** Because polling places are organized by a local jurisdiction , you may have to do some web searching. In Somers, voting occurs at the Town Hall Auditorium (600 Main St). Questions? Contact the Registrar of Voters at <u>Somers.registrar@gmail.com</u> or 860.763.8207

***Decide when you will cast your ballot.** Tell a friend what your plan is and have your friend tell you their plan. Then hold each other accountable to vote. It turns out that if you have an "only sometimes voter" friend, this act can get them to cast their ballot!

*Study! Get to know what's on your ballot.

*Learn about the candidates and issues. Most candidates have websites. You can check the positions organizations you trust have taken. Schedule a couple social events with close friends to talk about what's on the ballot, maybe asking each person to do some research on a race or issue.

***Pray and talk about it:** The UCC has a program called *Our Faith Our Vote* (<u>https://www.ucc.org/</u><u>our-faith-our-vote/</u>) that contains issue guides, worship and prayer materials, and suggestions for having faithful and respectful conversations.

And last but not least...VOTE!
