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

### Our Church History

### **Founding of Our Church and Our First Pastor**

In 1723, a vote at the Enfield church allowed the establishment of a separate precinct in East Enfield (Somers) with the power to levy a tax to support our own minister.

You can imagine the difficulties in communication and transportation in those days. Everything was by horseback or ox cart over roads that often were trails through the woods. Finding a Pastor was not easy and, once found, he had to have the approval of the congregation. Getting this approval was apparently not easy either.

In July 1725, a call was extended to Mr. Daniel Elmer with a day of humiliation and fasting set for Sept. 22 and his ordination for Oct. 6, with ministers and elders invited from as far away as Framingham and Marlboro. Something was amiss because Mr. Elmer was not approved. Arbiters and attorneys were called in and Mr. Elmer left with a cash settlement and a letter of recommendation. 1.

Now the process had to start all over, this time with more success.

"At a legal meeting held Oct. 12, 1726, it was voted to hire Mr. Samuel Allis upon probation and on Oct. 28 it was voted to pay Mr. Allis 20 shillings a Sabbath and his keeping of a house." In Nov. 1726, making his approval more permanent, a town meeting voted to give Mr. Allis 80 pounds and 20 pounds in labor toward the building of a house and 60 pounds a year salary for 5 years. Sometimes this was paid in grain. 2.

On March 15, 1727, Samuel Allis was ordained and a covenant signed. This gathering of our church was our official founding. Eight men besides Mr. Allis signed the original covenant and their wives joined "at the first communion". Four years later when the first meeting house was built, it is said that all the inhabitants of Somers, about 180, could sit on the sills of the meeting house.

Samuel Allis was born in Hatfield, MA on Dec. 5, 1705, the son of a carpenter. He graduated from Harvard in the class of 1724 and studied theology with the Rev. Solomon Stoddard in Northhampton. For the first few years, our church services were held in individual homes, often in the home of Nathaniel Horton Jr. An interesting note: Many of you know Jim and Ginny Rogers, who used to go to our church. Nathaniel Horton of Somers was an early ancestor of Jim Rogers.

Mr. Allis was our Pastor for twenty years, until 1747. Town records of Nov. 1746 report a disagreement between Mr. Allis and the town folk probably over his payment. By the spring of 1747, with the help of outside arbitration, Rev. Mr. Allis and the church and the town agreed on his dismissal from the pastorate with him receiving the house that he had built on Scully Road when first coming to Somers plus 260 acres of farmland to work.

He lived in Somers until his death in 1796 at age 91, "amiably rendering occasional services to the church in preaching and negotiation of conflicts." 3. You can see his tombstone in the North Cemetery.

An interesting note is that Mr. Allis was the owner of 2 or 3 slaves.

"In 1774, CT forbade further importation of slaves and provided that Negroes born after 1784 were to be free at the age of 25. The census of 1790 shows CT had 2759 slaves and 2801 free Negroes." 4.


