There are three elements that are almost always part of Lent: prayer, giving something up and giving something back.





Building the First Meeting House

The next few articles will be about our meeting houses, our church buildings. Although these are important, as the hymn reminds us, "The church is not a

building".

We are reminded of this in a sermon given in 1892 by our pastor, Rev. Charles Ricketts, at the rededication of the third meeting house after a major renovation.

"Our success in the future will not depend on a beautiful church to worship in, nor in our freedom from debt and absence of all disquieting factions. The material temple is not the essential church of the living God. The real church is only the place where the gospel of faith and good works is dispensed."

It is now 1729. For two and a half years, since March 15, 1727, when our church was first gathered and our first Pastor was ordained, we had been meeting in the homes of church members.

By Oct. 9, 1729 we had gathered some money and voted to build a meeting house. It wasn't easy! There was much discussion and dissension about where and how big to build it. By the Dec. 28, 1730 town meeting we were still discussing. Davis calls it "an unholy row".

Finally, in March 1731, an outside committee of "disinterested people" had to be called in. They decided to build it in the northern part of our North Cemetery (corner of Stebbins Road and Springfield Road) 45 feet long, 38 feet wide and 20 feet between the joynts (floor to ceiling).

At a town meeting on Nov. 1, 1731, the town meeting voted to provide 4 bushels of wheat, 2 barrels of cider and 4 gallons of rum for the raising of the meeting house. At a later meeting they voted to eliminate the wheat and just have the cider and the rum. Although it isn't mentioned in the meeting minutes, I would guess that the ladies of the church provided food to go with the liquid refreshments.

The church was raised between Nov. 10 and Dec. 27, 1731. It was a good time, after the harvest work was done and before the snows of winter.

Davis states that "yearly grants were needed for ten years before the building was finished." A note in 1736 says 40 pounds was raised to glaze the meeting house, build the pulpit and start the body of the seats.

"The History of Tolland County" says that two and a half acres of land was set aside around the meeting house and "it was voted that any inhabitant in the precinct should have liberty to build a small house for himself, his family and also shelter for his horse upon the land purchased by the society around the meeting house."

Additional Town History:

In 1727, the Enfield town meeting voted to allow the East Precinct (Somers) money for starting a school which was built near the meeting house.

In 1734 our town was incorporated under the name of Somers, named after Lord Somers.

In 1747 the town of Somers voted "to be dismissed from ye government of Massachusetts and be brought under ye government of Connecticut." In 1749 the town began to do business under the laws of Connecticut.

In 1750 the town meeting voted to build a bridge over the Scantic at the county road. There are many mentions in town meeting minutes of money being paid to various town members for the use of their "bulls", which I guess to be oxen, for the improvement of town roads.




