

Letter from the Pastor

"No winter lasts forever; no spring skips its turn. April is a promise that May is bound to keep, and we know it." -Hal Borland (1900-1978)

Recently, I was chatting with a group of pastors and one of them shared a recent conversation that had had with a church member. The member had asked to chat about their concerns that the church wasn't offering "something" that fit her needs. They had recently retired, the kids were out of the house, and they were wondering what was next. One of the phrases that kept coming up was that she just didn't feel like she fit in at the church.

So as the two of them drank coffee the pastor asked her, "What do you need? What are you looking for?" It was a question the member struggled to answerbut I know she's not alone.

As a pastor, I often hear this question being asked over and over again -- except that it usually sounds more like this: "someone" should be doing "something." For each person that worries about that "someone," the "something" is slightly different. But something must be done!

For me, this is the sticking point. I'm guessing many of us remember the days when everyone wasn't quite so busy and there always seemed like there was "someone" to help. Now it seems that people are busy and everyone has something else they need to do.. There isn't as much time to lend a hand to help with Coffee Hour, serve on a committee, or help with a mission project. We know this.

But, that doesn't stop us from lamenting that "someone" should really do "something."

Recently I read an article by the theologian Brian McLaren entitled *Joining the Resurrection*. Something about these words spoke to me as we journey through the Season of Lent and into Holy Week-a time that ends with the miracle of the empty tomb. I've been discerning the ways that resurrection isn't just something that happens to Jesus but happens to each and every "someone."

McLaren says it best here: It is good and right to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus on Easter morning, but

even better and greater to choose to affiliate with it . . . to identify with it, to join it, to enter it and let it enter and fill us, to give ourselves to it and receive all it offers us, so we can wholeheartedly participate in it and with it, so that resurrection keeps spreading until eveop rything is healed and everything is new and all is well and all manner of things are well.

This happens when each and every "someone" realizes that there are no hands and no feet but our own. We can't outsource it. We don't have all of the money, power, and prestige in the world...but we are the ones we've been waiting for. We are the someones that will do "something." It might not look like it once did because our ministry will change as much as we have changed.

Highlights

When we are able to recognize this change, and connect with it enough to believe that all is well and all manner of things are well, we will be able to do "something" about it. We will realize we are the someones and maybe even be clearer about what it is that we need most.

For, surely, this knowledge is what will allow us to participate in the resurrection wholeheartedly -- when we know what it is that we need most and then try to do something about it.

My door is open if you would like to chat more about this.

The Great Awakening and a Turbulent Time in Somers



Our Church History

Between 1730 and 1745 there was a time of great religious revival in New England, known as The Great Awakening. Our first pastor, Rev. Samuel Allis, presided over two revivals in Somers in 1736-1737 and 1741-1742. Our church records show that many families were baptized during that time. 1.

A leader of The Great Awakening was the great evangelist, Jonathan Edwards. Born in East Windsor in 1703, the son and grandson of pastors, he became the Pastor in Northampton and later the president of Princeton. One of his most famous sermons was preached in our parent church in Enfield, "Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God".

There began to be much dissension between the "Old Lights" or Memorialists, the more traditional, conservative Congregationalists and the more evangelical Separates or "New Lights".

Rev. Freegrace Leavit, our second pastor from 1748 until his death in 1761, seemed to lean toward the "Old Lights". After his death, Somers could not settle on a pastor and eight different men preached in as many years but none was ordained until Rev. Samuel Ely arrived in 1767.

Controversy surrounded Mr. Ely. In April 1769 he was to be ordained but no clergy could be found who would ordain him so a group of his supporters, "New Lights" or Separates, decided to secede from the church and ordain him themselves.

This group continued to meet in the original meeting house while the "Old Lights" met in the home of Dr. Samuel Reynolds. 3.

In 1771, the Memorialists appealed to the CT General Assembly and received the resolve of the Assembly that the Memorialists were "to be the only Ecclesiastical Society in the Town of Somers and ought to have the entire use and possession of the meeting house and also the lands given for the benefit of the ministries." They reproved "the said Ely" and his followers.

The 1771 document is from the "General Assembly of the Gov. and Company of the Colony of Connecticut, holden at New Haven on the Second Thursday of October Anno Dom. 1771". We have this original document, the oldest piece of paper in our archives.

After this, becoming disillusioned with Mr. Ely, some of the Separates returned to the old church. However, those still loyal to Mr. Ely remained with him and built a separate meeting house on Turnpike Road just north of Florida Road. 4

In 1773 the town voted to seek advice from a council of ministers. The council recommended that the Separates reconcile with the established congregation and suspend Mr. Ely's ministerial duties. After this, the church members voted to "Forget and forgive all past offences towards each other." (Somers town records.) 5.

The town finally reunited under the ministerial authority of Rev. Charles Backus in 1774. 6.

While in Somers, Mr. Ely married a Somers girl, Beulah Billings and had three daughters. 7. It seems that Mrs. Ely stayed in Somers while Samuel did itinerate preaching and protested against the Massachusetts government's treatment of small farmers and businessmen.

In 1782 he emerged as a leader in a series of protests that included mobbing the Northampton Court of Common Pleas. He was arrested but was eventually released and moved to Vermont and Maine where he continued his protests. 8.

Our church has a copy of an interesting thesis written by Shelby M. Balik for her Master of Arts (History) degree from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 2000, "Persecuted in the Bowels of a Free Republic, Samuel Ely's Theology of Justice". Some of her research was done at our church with the help of Marge Griswold (church historian) and Lori Lenthe (administrative assistant).


