Dear Somers Congregational UCC Community:

Sunday, August 31st, my last day in worship with you, is fast approaching. As it does, I find myself absolutely flooded with memories and gratitude for all the fun, funny, heartfelt, difficult, and sad things we've been through together in the time that I have been your Pastor and Teacher. Thank you for letting me be a part of your lives.

Leaving can be a painful but also sacred process. The pain of separation and the discombobulation of losing someone in your orbit are very real. There is a grief process including all those feelings of sadness, anger, bargaining, denial, and acceptance.

It is also a time to get to the heart of why someone or something is so important to you, and what that says about what you need and want for the future. That can be the seed of a new beginning.

Although we will soon be apart, know that I am thinking of you and praying for you daily. And when I leave, I trust that we will each continue to cherish our time together and to hold it as a gift of grace received in gratitude.

Bound by the UCC Ministerial Code of Ethics, there are a few boundaries I must set as I leave my professional relationship with you all and become your former Pastor with the purpose of making space for the new ministry that will continue after I leave.

- 1. I will need to be out of contact with you until at least twelve months have passed and you are well into building relationships with your new leadership. This includes social media, which has become almost a second form of church. I will need to disconnect from you there for the same amount of time. On Facebook, this has the unfortunate term of "unfollowing." It does not mean that you are not my friends or that I don't love you dearly! But it does mean that we will need to separate our daily lives from each other in a way that social media connections make difficult.
- 2. **As a former pastor, I can no longer be your pastor.** That means I can't lead worship, do pastoral care, lead weddings, funerals, baptisms, and other things that I would have done as your pastor.



3. Because my family is still living in the area for the next year, it is quite possible that you will cross paths. I know they will be delighted to run into you, but they won't be able to discuss with you things about SCUCC; the future of your church remains with you. Please understand that if they need to put a limit on the conversations, it is out of love for the church and its health.

I know boundaries can be hard and can sharpen the pain of separation. But a church cannot move forward with a former pastor lurking in the background. Your focus needs to be on your future together, seeking out your next leaders and vision. You can count on my prayers for you, and a love that endures all, even from afar.

Finally, I ask your forgiveness, for things I've done poorly and things I've left undone. I offer my forgiveness freely to you as well, and feel deeply grateful for God's grace guiding us through all of this.

Somers Congregational UCC, you are gifted with a history to be proud of and a community to take pride in. You have an amazing and talented staff and strong lay leadership to guide you on your future path. God is with you and will always be ready to inspire you further toward justice and joy. The Southern New England Conference, the Tolland Association and the wider UCC stand ready to assist and encourage you.



### Did you know....


Champ's regularly provides food for approximately **80** families. Donations come in through various local organizations as well as deliveries from Food Share.



# Our Church History

### **Our Third Meeting House**

This information is taken from a history of our church written by Rev. Ransom Hammond, our Pastor from 1973 to 1987.


By the year 1840, our second meeting house was in such need of repair that it was decided to build a new church on Main Street which was by then "conceded to be the center of importance." This new church was finished in 1842 at a cost of \$6000. The basement of the church was the town hall and there, town meetings were held over the years and indeed until the erection of our present town hall in 1948.

In 1892 extensive repairs were made and from a report of the rededication ceremonies held at that time we learn that "the galleries and vestibule have been ceiled; the old windows and blinds have been replaced with the modern cathedral glass windows, the walls repapered and decorated, a polished brass chandelier and two elegant candelabra for the pulpit take the place of the old lamps and the whole inside thoroughly painted." In 1925, an electrically operated pipe organ was presented as a memorial and dedicated with impressive ceremony.

In 1945, the church decided that extensive repairs were again needed and the Christian Heritage Fund, with a goal of \$12,000, was inaugurated. Finished in 1947, the repairs included a complete renovation of the exterior, alterations to the basement, extensive changes in the auditorium and chancel and refurbishing of the whole interior. The organ console was moved to the front of the church. At this time the town offered to move the chapel which stood across the street, to the rear of the church in exchange for a deed to the land on which it stood. A foundation was erected and the chapel known as "Pilgrim Hall" was moved to its present location, once again with an impressive rededication service.

During the following years the church continued to grow until it became necessary to plan for the erection of an educational building. In 1959, we formally dedicated our new Parish House, a two story building of colonial design in keeping with the architecture of the church. This was named "The Bugbee Center" to honor Emily Bugbee our much beloved church school superintendent.

An account of the changing physical properties of the church, while they are not all-important in themselves, do give a very graphic indication of the vigor, vitality and growth of the Somers Congregational Church over the years. We think of ourselves as a truly community church serving the spiritual interests of the community and offering to all the opportunity to freely worship God and to join with others in actively carrying forward the work of the church.







As we continue **Dreaming God's Dream - No** Gift too Small, No Dream too Big, let us reflect on **why do we make a** commitment of support to our church?

We can give to our congregation without turning in a commitment card. So why write down our intention for the coming year? Of course, telling the church about our intention helps leaders plan. But we ask you to write down your intentions for another reason.

Jesus told us to love God with our heart, mind, soul, and strength; and to love our neighbors as ourselves.

A commitment card can engage us in all those ways as we express our love of God and neighbor.

**Heart:** We feel the love and support of people in the congregation.

This is the place where we belong.

Mind: We think about our resources, both our income and our accumulated assets

when deciding on what commitment to make in the coming year.

Soul: We experience the hope that comes from making a commitment to the

future. A commitment card symbolizes our confidence in God's future

and makes us part of helping that future come about.

Strength: We do what we can to help support our community.

What might God do with what you have to offer?




